# 5 WAYS CUCUMBERS

Will Keep you COOL!



One of the few vegetables you just can't cook, cucumbers are the perfect snack for hot, humid summer days.

- ① Slice a cucumber, toss with lime juice, cilantro, and a dash of rice vinegar
- ② Slice a cucumber, toss with chopped basil, lemon juice, crumbled feta, and white wine vinegar.
- ③ Slice a cucumber, toss with yogurt, a dash of lemon juice, and fresh mint.
- ④ Slice a cucumber. Top each slice with a dollop of cream cheese, your favorite chopped herb, a bit of black pepper.
- ⑤ Slice a cucumber, toss with arugula, goat cheese, diced red onion, and a splash of balsamic vinaigrette.

# Who makes all these holes in my food? holy arugula!

Pests... they are everywhere! Because we don't use pesticides (yuck!), we do a whole lot of other things to protect our crops from all the bugs - we cover 'em with row cover so nothing can crawl in, treat our soil with lots of compost, teeming with 'beneficial bugs'... and sometimes pick pests off and squish 'em bare handed! Even so... some bugs still get in - and make those irritating holes!

## The flea Beetle

only 1/16" - tiny little flying beetles that make lots of tiny round holes in... pretty much anything with leaves! They are the worst when they emerge in spring. We cover everything larva with many

## Mexican Bean Beetle

Eat leaves of beans, can chew away whole plants, leaving nothing over winter on field edges lay their eggs on bean leaves.

## Army Worms

Larvae! Brownish green with white stripes - they eat at night and hide during the day. They eat big holes in lots of different kinds of vegetable crops.

## Cabbage Lopper

These bright green larvae chew up broccoli, cabbage, kale and other brassica leaves. They "loop" their bodies to move. Emerge in early spring.


## Cucumber Striped Beetle

Yellow and black, they are fast movers, eating leaves of squash, cucumbers. They bury their eggs in soil at base of plants. We squish 'em when we see 'em!

## \*WHAT WE'RE WEEDING:


- new, baby squash and cucumbers
- HOT PEPPERS (we ran out of straw before we could mulch them...)
- BASIL • Beets (4 kinds of 'em, all sizes)
- BIG GRASSES from old beds, empty of crops (We have to empty them of weeds, too, before we can plant in them again.)

## \*WHAT WE'RE SEEDING:

Not much. The soil is so hot and so dry. Any seeds we put into the ground will just shrivel and fry. So our seeding is on hold for now.

In the greenhouse: LOTS OF FALL LETTUCES

## \*WHAT WE'RE HARVESTING:



Garlic! After 8 months in the ground, we finally harvested all our garlic. We pulled up the stalks, tied them in bunches of 5-10, and hung them in the upper Barn to cure. Expect to see some in 3-4 weeks.

## \*WHAT WE'RE HOPING FOR:

- RAIN RAIN RAIN RAIN (which hopefully will have come by the time you read this)
