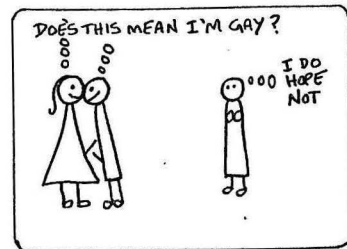
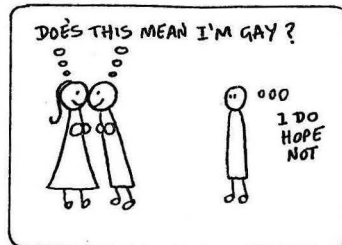


FOX & SNAKE

- BiQueer zine -



We may call ourselves bi, pansexual, queer, unlabelled, fluid, or refuse to call ourselves anything based on romantic or sexual attraction. The reason why we gather under the flag of bisexuality is not that we want to promote a binary view of gender, are split between two separate realities, or need to maintain two relationships at any given time, but simply that it is the most commonly used word and thus allows us to find each other, regardless of how inadequate its etymology may be. We come from the margin, from the fringe of other groups and communities, and our strength is that we gather at their centre, where their different interests may either clash or merge. As individuals we are about as contrasted as it gets. We often travel uncharted territory and when we meet other bis we see that even though our experiences are extremely varied they still converge on many points.



To our LGTIQ friends I would like to say:

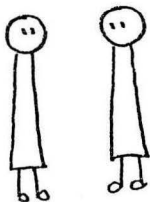
Do not call us allies. We are full members of the community. I have often heard bis themselves say that we are not political, that there is no particular cause to rally us. I believe that we represent a whole range of situations that require political change. Bis can be queer, genderqueer or transgendered, we often are in the same-sex couples that demand equality, may indeed be romantically involved with gay, lesbian and/or transgendered partners, may well dedicate ourselves to gay parenting, and most importantly we have been fighting for LGTIQ rights within the community since the beginning. I want to stress that bisexuality is situated at the intersection of all of these - as well as other - groups, and yet it has its own particular issues to address, too, as the Bisexual

Manifesto you'll find in this zine (first published anonymously in Getting Bi before being translated into Hebrew and retranslated into English by Shiri Eisner) clearly shows. Biphobia can be found within straight and LGTIQ communities, and it prevents many bis from finding acceptance, except perhaps in the very few places where a bi group can be found.

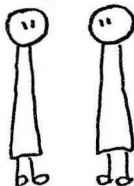
To my bi friends I would like to say: Think about ways in which we can create a safe environment for our community. This requires that we educate ourselves and show an awareness of LGTIQ-related issues. Bis tend to be very welcoming of others and manifest an explicit desire to be inclusive, and yet we sometimes downplay or misinterpret the problems and inequalities experienced by other minority groups when we overlook race, class, gender, and the social dynamics they produce. With this zine I would like to explore the intersection of bi with other queer communities. I hope to show that bis are involved in a large variety of contexts and investigate how they negotiate acceptance and belonging in alternative communities.

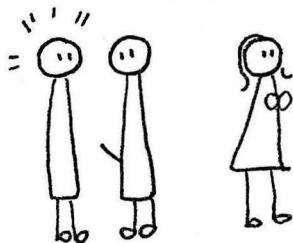
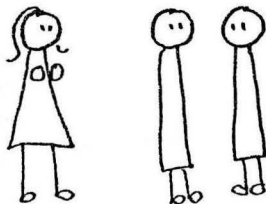
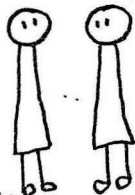
I'M BISEXUAL
